A Note from the Superintendent

Last school year we utilized the quarantine rooms heavily from the start of the school year through the end of September. Health needs slowed down in October, then we had a surge in illness support in early November with all quarantine rooms being used for about a week to care for students with the flu and RSV. Except for a couple of isolated cases during the first two weeks of school, we did not have COVID or other illness outbreaks to require the use of the designated quarantine rooms in the fall.

When students returned from their home communities in January through the end of the month, we had students who tested positive for COVID and spent time isolating. We did not utilize universal screening and sent students to the MEHS Student Health Clinic so the nurses could determine which students should be tested based on the severity of symptoms and health factors of each individual student. The greatest number of students needing isolation and quarantine so far this school year has been three students.

Much of my focus over the last year has gone toward gaining a deeper understanding of my role as a Division Director, as compared to my role as Superintendent. Last spring, I got oriented to the more visible difference, in my relationship with legislators. This summer and well into the fall, the focus has been on finances and the budget process. The more I work through those processes, the greater I see the need to bring our enrollment numbers back to pre-pandemic levels.

Program Highlight - Music

The MEHS music program hit the ground running in our classes this fall! We are excited to offer students a full band experience, from beginning band and concert band during the school day to jazz band and pep band on the weekends. Guitar class is widely popular among students. We had 27 students enroll during the first trimester. The first-trimester choir was the most advanced group of singers we have had in the last 5 years, and it is exciting to see their growth. We capped off the first trimester with a music showcase concert series during the October Saturday school. This was well received with audiences of about 120 people for each class.

Region V hosts an Honor Festival for band and choir students every year. All students in the Region enrolled in their school's music program are eligible to audition for a spot in the honor band or choir. The top musicians in the band and choir are then selected by the Region V music teachers and invited to attend the Honor Festival. This year's event was held in Craig, October 22-25. Students rehearsed Sunday evening through Tuesday afternoon and presented their work in a concert on Tuesday evening.

This number represents the most students named to the Honor Choir from one school out of all schools in the region for the second year in a row!

Each year, ASAA holds an All-State music festival in November, and students apply to the All-State Band, Orchestra, and Choir through a recorded audition process. The best musicians from across the state are invited to gather for 3 days to prepare and present the All-State Gala concert. MEHS was again well represented this year in the All-State choir. For the first time ever, all of our students who auditioned received recognition at the All-State level. Senior: Khaila Fratis, and Juniors: Brooklyn Roland-Dewitt and Eva Nay were named to the All-State Treble Choir and participated in this year's festival. Sophomore: Kate Plaisance was named the first alternate to the same group.

The music program has been invited to perform at a few holiday events in December, and we look forward to the second half of the year, which will be full of exciting opportunities for our students!
