♦ ISSUE

The board is being asked to re-adopt proposed amendments to regulations related to the qualification and certification of Alaska educators.

♦ BACKGROUND

- The proposed regulations address elements of two of the six essential areas identified by the Alaska Governor's Working Group on Teacher Retention and Recruitment (TRR) including expanding certification pathways, simplifying qualifications, and streamlining the certification process.
- The proposed regulations address the TRR Working Group recommendation to expand certification pathways by:
 - o Allowing individuals holding at least a bachelor's degree to qualify for a special education teacher and special services alternative program certification;
 - Allowing for credits and degrees offered by nationally accredited institutions of higher education to meet certification requirements;
 - Expanding certification renewal and additional endorsement options to include micro-credentials approved by the department;
 - Allowing all paraprofessionals with two years of experience to qualify for the Instructional Assistant Type I limited certificate that provides a pathway to full teacher certification; and
 - Allowing for the addition of an elementary education endorsement with three
 years of teaching experience and passing scores on content area examinations in
 elementary education and teaching reading.
- The proposed regulations address areas that will simplify qualification requirements. Regulation changes to qualification requirements include the following:
 - Increases the testing options available to paraprofessionals to achieve qualified status;
 - Removes additional coursework requirements for special education teachers providing service to preschoolers and teachers of gifted children;
 - o Removes the recency credit requirements for the regular administrative (Type B) and special services (Type C) certificates;
 - o Removes the mathematics basic competency subtest requirement for individuals applying for the World Language Limited Certificate; and
 - o Allows all endorsements earned in another state and awarded on an initial out-ofstate certificate be placed on subsequent certificates without further review.
- The proposed regulations address areas that will streamline the certification process. Regulation changes to streamline requirements include the following:
 - o Requires a copy of a government issued identification instead of notarization;

- o Requires all certificate types to complete the mandatory trainings;
- Allows for eligible initial teaching certificates to be valid for up to five years and renewable:
- Allows for limited certificates to be transferred from one district to another district;
- Extends the amount of time that a background check conducted for a student teacher authorization can be used when applying for an initial teacher certificate; and
- o Makes a technical correction to the qualifications for the school psychologist endorsement.
- In response to public comment, the proposed revision to the master teaching certificate have been removed. In addition, the requirements to add an elementary endorsement have been increased from two to three years of teaching experience and now include passing scores on content area examinations in elementary education and teaching reading.
- The proposed regulations and public comment can be found behind this cover memo.
- Susan McKenzie, Director of the Division of Innovation and Education Excellence; Sondra Meredith, Administrator of Teacher Education & Certification; and Susan Sonneborn, Assistant Attorney General, will be present to brief the board.
